Hi Andrew,

I did a bit of research and contacted the CRD. The regional district contracts with CREST to provide an emergency communications system for the region. Four requisitions by the CRD fund the contracted costs. There is one regional requisition and three more for each of the electoral areas. The three electoral area requisitions are based primarily on the number of radios dedicated for use in the area.

For the Salt Spring Fire Protection District, because its area of responsibility is also an electoral area, it looks like the charge related to the radios used by the SSFPD are contained in the requisition by the CRD to the Salt Spring electoral area. So I don't think the SSFPD will see direct billing for current or future costs related to CREST. But this is something that should be confirmed directly with contacts at CREST and the CRD.
