

Operations

Ten apparatus and twenty-four members promptly left the new 2025 recruits during the meet and greet event when a structure fire on Jones Road was paged out at 21:41 January 7, 2025. Crews used approximately 4,500 gallons of water to extinguish a 5th wheel trailer that unfortunately was destroyed by the time crews arrived on scene. Crews shuttled water from Fire Hall #2 in the Burgoyne valley to the emergency scene and overhauled the area to ensure no fire spread. Emergency Social Services were called to assist the tenants with a housing, and other basic needs.

Reserve Shelter: A new concrete pad and shelter was erected behind Fire Hall #2 to house our reserve equipment. Engine 202 will be housed in the tent for now until the new firehall is completed, at which point Tender 302 will move under the cover.


