



Operations


May's call of note was a structure fire on May 22nd on Arbutus Rd.

At 19:25 the department was paged out for a structure fire on a commercial property. Upon arrival our POC crews from Hall 3 arrived to find a large shed fully involved with fire and spreading to the surrounding vegetation. Twenty-two members used 10,000 gallons of water to attack the fire and control the spread. While the shed, which housed an ATV, tractor and forklift, was a total loss, the crews did an exceptional job creating a water curtain on the house and containing the fire to the original structure. The fire was investigated and was determined to be accidental. SSIFR would like to thank the occupants on scene for their quick call to 911 and assistance through-out the call.








Prevention

In May Salt Spring Fire Rescue performed 11 Fire Smart Fire Assessment, 3 CPR classes at GISS and 1 Pre school came to the hall for a tour and learned about calling 911.

Training
